Welcome to the latest edition of the Somerset LPC bulletin; thank you for everything you continue to do to provide first class services to the population of our beautiful county.

An update on the Transforming Pharmacy Representation programme

I wrote to you last month to update you on the ongoing Transformation Pharmacy Representation (TAPR) activity that will bring changes to how you are represented nationally and locally. As part of this process we put forward proposals which included remaining as a Somerset representative body with an updated constitution and a short delay in the start of our next committee cycle (to July) to allow for new elections. I am pleased to say that after our Special General Meeting there was a 100% vote in favour of the proposals - see Notification of Somerset LPC SGM voting. Thank you for your support and we will now move forward with the proposals, which include formally changing our name from Somerset LPC to Community Pharmacy Somerset and elections for the new committee. Details on how to put yourself forward for elections will be coming out to you in the next few weeks and I encourage you all to consider putting yourself forward. Whilst this programme of work has taken place, the committee and officers have continued to work hard on your behalf and will continue to do so as we move forward through another busy year.

NHS.net email is used for essential services such as Turning Point, GP-CPCS referrals outside of Somerset and in cases of PharmOutcomes outage. Please continue to remind your whole team, including relief staff and all locums, to check your NHS.NET email regularly throughout each day your pharmacy is open and action the messages.

Pharmacy Quality Scheme (PQS) 2022-23

****IMPORTANT****

The PQS 2022-23 declaration period is open until 11:59pm on Friday 03 March 2023 – claim now! [Action]

- You can claim your PQS payment using the MYS application for the PQS 2022-23 during the declaration period which is **between 9am on 06 Feb 2023 and 11.59pm on 03 Mar 2023**.
- You must have evidence to demonstrate meeting the gateway criteria and the domains that you have claimed for by the end of 31 Mar 2023.
- NHSBSA has published the questions which will be included in the 2022-23 PQS declaration so you can view these ahead of making your declaration.
- The questions are available on the NHSBSA PQS hub page; you should scroll down to the 'Declaration questions' section where you can access the questions in a Word document.

Pharmacy Quality Scheme (PQS) - Introduction

The Pharmacy Quality Scheme (PQS) forms part of the Community Pharmacy Contractual Framework (CPCF). It supports delivery of the NHS Long Term Plan and rewards community pharmacy contractors that deliver quality criteria.

- In previous years Somerset community pharmacy contractors have been amazing by achieving the criteria, supporting patients and claiming all PQS payments that they can.
- Your LPC appreciates that many contractors will also be looking to their HQ for specific PQS completion guidance; we would also flag that those independents who are NPA members will be receiving PQS support packs too.

2023 - NHS Profile	Addressing Unwarranted Variation in Care domain - Palliative and End of Life Care Action Plan As soon as possible after 16 Jan 2023 and by the end of 31 Mar 2023:
manager can be updated	 You must update your NHS Profile Manager if you routinely hold the 16 palliative and end of life critical medicines listed below and in the in the PQS Drug Tariff and support local access to parenteral haloperidol. If NHS Profile Manager is updated centrally by your head office, it will need to be confirmed that this will be done by the end of 31 Mar 2023.
	The 16 critical end of life medicines are: Cyclizine solution for injection ampoules 50mg/1ml Cyclizine tablets 50mg Dexamethasone solution for injection ampoules 3.3mg/1ml Dexamethasone tablets 2mg Haloperidol tablets 500 mcg Hyoscine butylbromide solution for injection 20mg/1ml Levomepromazine solution for injection ampoules 25mg/1ml Metoclopramide solution for injection ampoules 10mg/2ml Midazolam solution for injection ampoules 10mg/2ml Morphine sulfate oral solution 10g/5ml Morphine sulfate solution for injection ampoules 10mg/1ml Morphine sulfate solution for injection ampoules 30mg/1ml Oxycodone solution for injection ampoules 10mg/1ml Oxycodone oral solution sugar free 5mg/5ml Sodium chloride 0.9% solution for injection ampoules 10ml Water for injections 10ml.
	• If you are not a stockholder of these 16 palliative and end of life critical medicines, you are not required to update NHS Profile Manager. But by the end of 31 Mar 2023, you must have a Palliative and end of life care action

- **plan** in place to use when you do not have the required stock of the 16 critical medicines listed above or parenteral haloperidol available for a patient.
- The action plan must include collated information from pharmacies in your area to be able to aid a patient, relative/carer in obtaining medication as swiftly as possible by redirecting them to the nearest open community pharmacy that stocks the 16 critical end of life medicines and/or parenteral haloperidol.
- The action plan for 2022-23 must be available for inspection from the end of 31 Mar 2023 at premises level.

The action plan must include:

- An awareness of any locally commissioned services for palliative care including any on call and delivery arrangements.
- A list of community pharmacies stocking the 16 critical medicines for palliative/end of life care in your area and noting the ability to check the Directory of Services (DoS) to find pharmacies stocking these medicines.
- Details of where parenteral haloperidol can be accessed locally, e.g. through any local commissioning arrangements.
- Awareness of other support services that may be useful for patients/relatives/carers.

- CPPE has provided <u>Pharmacy Quality Scheme webpages</u> to support you to meet the training requirements of the scheme.
- There is a page for each domain including information on the learning and assessments developed or hosted by CPPE and/or links to required learning from other providers, as relevant.
- One of the key differences in this year's PQS compared to previous years is the inclusion of 'validity periods' for learning. This means that you may be required to repeat training and e-assessments that you have completed previously, depending on the stated validity period and when you last completed the training and e-assessments.

 CPPE has included a useful tracker on the <u>PQS home page</u> to help you to easily identify which learning and e-assessments you need to complete to meet the requirements of the PQS 2022-23.
 The tracker works for GPhC registered pharmacy professionals and non-registrants with a <u>non-GPhC registrant account.</u>

Operations

1. Pharmacy Pressures Survey: Deadline extended – please complete now [Action]



- The deadline for the PSNC nationwide Pharmacy Pressures Survey has been extended.
- If pharmacy owners and team members can please spare just a few minutes, completing this survey would really help the efforts to get policymakers to take action to mitigate the immense pressures you are facing.

2. Retirement of group A strep interim clinical guidance [Information]

- NHS England has retired interim clinical guidance which lowered the threshold for prescribing antibiotics with potential strep A infections, following a recent reduction in infection rates.
- Clinicians have been advised to 'continue to be alert to the severe complications of GAS and maintain a high degree of clinical suspicion when assessing patients'.
- NHS England, UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) and relevant bodies will continue to monitor the situation closely.
- NICE Sore Throat (Acute) NG84 guideline has been reinstated for all age groups.

3. New HRT pre-payment certificate [Information]

- The new HRT pre-payment certificate (PPC) is set to launch on 1 April 2023 and will cost the same as two single prescription charges currently £18.70
- Patients will apply for the HRT PPC through the NHS Business Services Authority or in person at a
 pharmacy registered to sell PPCs. It will be valid for 12 months for any HRT items licensed for use
 for menopause in the UK and listed on the HRT medicines list published in the Drug Tariff Part XVI
 HRT items.
- Prescribers should issue HRT prescriptions separately; if a patient with a valid HRT PPC presents a
 mixed prescription and asks to be exempted from HRT charges, the pharmacist may refuse to
 dispense the mixed prescription or may agree to dispense just the HRT or non-HRT items. If this
 happens, patients should request new prescriptions for the items that are not dispensed.
 Alternatively, they can pay for all items and receive a FP57 receipt and refund form to claim back
 the charges paid for the HRT items covered by their HRT PPC.
- There will be an exemption category on pharmacy IT systems and paper prescription forms. Where pharmacy IT systems have not yet updated to implement the new HRT PPC, pharmacy

- teams should select the prescription prepayment certificate (PPC) exemption until the new HRT PPC exemption category is implemented in their system.
- Updated paper FP10s with the category 'W' for HRT PPC will be put into circulation from the
 beginning of April 2023 but old stock should be used until supplies are used up. Guidance for
 workarounds where old prescription forms or tokens are presented, or dispensing systems have
 not been updated, will be issued in due course.

2. Dexcom One Transmitter to be added to March 2023 Drug Tariff [Action]



- The Department of Health of Social Care (DHSC) has confirmed that the Dexcom One Transmitter will be added to Part IXA of the March 2023 Drug Tariff.
- Previously, patients were advised to obtain the free-of-charge Dexcom One transmitters directly
 from pharmacies, without a prescription. PSNC told DHSC and Dexcom that these distribution
 arrangements for transmitters are unacceptable because they result in extra unfunded activity for
 community pharmacies. Acting upon these concerns, both DHSC and Dexcom agreed to add the
 Dexcom One transmitter to the Drug Tariff from March.
- Contractors should note the changes to reimbursement prices for the Dexcom sensor packs from March. To avoid any reimbursement risks, pharmacy contractors should avoid holding extra stock of the sensors and ensure prescriptions dispensed in February are submitted on time.
