Definition of Child Exploitation (CE)

'Child exploitation (originally known as child sexual exploitation) is a form of child sexual abuse. It occurs where an individual or group takes advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, manipulate or deceive a child or young person under the age of 18 into sexual activity (a) in exchange for something the victim needs or wants, and/or (b) for the financial advantage or increased status of the perpetrator or facilitator. The victim may have been sexually exploited even if the sexual activity appears consensual. Child sexual exploitation does not always involve physical contact; it can also occur through the use of technology.'

Child Exploitation in Somerset



Missed Opportunities

Little or no **recorded information on sexual partners / age and nature of relationship**

Repeated presentations for STIs / vaginal infections with no record of consent/ safeguarding

Number of pregnancies ending in miscarriage, TOP and live births

Child Exploitation

Child exploitation knows no boundaries. Any child, regardless of where they live, their cultural, ethnic and religious background, their sexuality or gender identity, can become a victim of this horrific crime.

Young people and professionals may normalise abuse experienced through CE, either because of lack of knowledge about CE or because it is viewed as 'normal' for, or by, the network or group the young person has been exploited in.


Perpetrators target the most vulnerable

Any young person can be a victim of child exploitation; however, perpetrators

often target those who are already very vulnerable.

How do we ask about Consent?

Traditionally we may have asked, 'Was the sex you had consensual' ?

- Do you feel you could say no to sex if you wanted to and you partner would be happy with this?
- Is this sex you wanted to have and were happy to have ?
- Have you ever had sex when you didn't want too ?
- Where did the sex happen, did you feel safe in this place ?
- Was there anyone else around when you had sex with your partner ?
- Does your partner every pressure you to have sex with him/her or anyone else ?

Final Points

- Any young person can be a victim of child exploitation.
- It can happen to boys as well as girls.
- It can happen to young people of all races and backgrounds.
- Young people experiencing problems at home who go missing or are in care can be vulnerable and particularly at risk,

but remember child exploitation can also happen to those from a loving and supportive home.

No matter who is affected by child exploitation, it is never, ever their fault – even if they agreed to the sexual activity because they felt they 'should'.

• A child may agree to sexual activity because they felt they had no other choice and or do not fully understand consent.

Supplying Emergency Contraception (EC) under a Patient Group Direction (PGD)

- The purpose of the Emergency Contraception service is to improve access.
- Pharmacists can only supply and/or administer medicines under PGDs if there is an advantage for the person without compromising their safety.
- Pharmacists **must** work within the limits of each PGD.
- The pharmacy should be registered with the commissioner for provision of this service – contact <u>yvonne.somersetlpc@gmail.com</u> for details.





Eligibility to provide the service

Each pharmacist, including locums, who are providing the service must:

- Read the levonorgestrel and ulipristal PGDs, complete the mandatory (and recommended) training and assessments.
- Sign each PGD to confirm they have read and understood the PGD and agree to supply the medicine only in accordance with it. The pharmacist's line manager also needs to sign the PGD.
- Keep a copy of each signed PGD in every pharmacy they provide the service from for inspection on request.
- Complete the Declaration of competence for Emergency contraception and share this information with PharmOutcomes.
- Keep their DoC and training and assessments up to date at the required time intervals.

Declaration of competence (DoC) for Emergency contraception

- Download and complete the DoC and statement of completion for Emergency contraception at the CPPE website:: <u>www.cppe.ac.uk/services/declaration-of-competence2</u>
- Add the Somerset specific learning on page 8 of your DoC, when you have completed it, as follows:
 - Community Pharmacy & Somerset Council Emergency Contraception and Child
 Exploitation online training.
 - Competencies in the DoC framework covered by this training are: 2 and a, c, f and g.
- Tick the box to allow your data to be shared with PharmOutcomes.
- Review your DoC regularly (recommended at least every 2 years) and after any updates to the PGDs you will be notified about this.





Disclosure and barring service (DBS) check

- Each pharmacist providing this service is required to have a current DBS check.
- Providing you have applied for your DBS check, or renewal, you can operate the PGDs.
- We advise you to set up a calendar alert at least 6 months before your DBS check is due for renewal.





Recording the consultation and supply

- Enter supplies in PharmOutcomes in a timely manner preferably during the consultation.
- Please take care when you are completing the form to make sure the information you enter is accurate as the layout of the form may change.



Your professional responsibilities

- Do not turn people away. Imagine the potential consequences if you do; you have a duty of care to refer anyone who you cannot make an emergency contraception supply to. This might be another pharmacy or service.
- If you have signed up and are trained to deliver the pharmacy contraception service, you could discuss whether regular contraception is appropriate.
- There is also an option to signpost to Somerset Wide Integrated Sexual Health Services (SWISH) for alternative contraceptive methods if more appropriate.
- Remember to use your person-centred consultation skills at all times.





Your professional responsibilities - safeguarding

- You have a professional responsibility to report any suspicions around child exploitation, safeguarding or FGM which you have so these can be followed up.
